Your parents carefully chose a name for you. It might be the name of a saint. It might be the name of your great-grandfather or grandmother or a favorite aunt or uncle. Perhaps your parents liked a particular name, and they wanted you to have it.

It is your name. "May you grow old with it," say the words of an Armenian blessing (anoonovut dzeranas).

What does it mean?




Listen to This

Many years ago, there were no calendars like the ones we use today. People used the Armenian Church calendar to remember special events in their lives. If a baby was born near the feast day of St. Vartan, the parents would choose a name from the list of names in the Armenian Church calendar for the feast day of Vartanantz. Possible names for the baby might be Khoren, Ardag, Vartan, Dajad, Vahan, Arsen or Karekin. These were all names of people who are connected with that day.

Our Armenian Way

In Armenia and other places, the family and relatives of the child celebrating his or her name day will attend church services and then gather for a family party. The party is a celebration of thanksgiving. Fruits and nuts are served as well as other treats. Oranges with candles burning in them are brought to the person whose name day it is, and sharagans and church songs are also sung.

How do you celebrate your birthday?

All names are special. If your name is not connected with a particular feast, then it is celebrated on the feast of All Saints Day in November or on Vartanantz.

For My Family

Sharing Our Faith

The children learned today how special their names are and how they were blessed, by name, at their baptism and chrismation. In the Armenian tradition, Name Days are celebrated by family and friends -- first, by a visit to church and then home for a family gathering. We talked about the meaning of names and the children made their own name plate that went up on a display board.

Your child may be full of questions about his or her name.

Living Our Faith

- 1. Tell your child how a name was chosen for him or her. This might be an opportunity to hear stories about the special person in his life for whom he might have been named.
- 2. With your child, make a list of a few questions about names that could be used to "interview" grandparents or other relatives. These could be simple: "Who named you? Why did you get this name? What does it mean? Do you like your name?" Bring the interview answers to your child's teacher.
- **3.** As part of the evening prayer, suggest that your child pray for the children of the world, asking God to bless and keep them. Remind your child that we are all a part of God's family.
