A Church of Our Own

The earliest known Armenians came to America in the first half of the 1800's.

Did you know that a few Armenians served as doctors and soldiers in the American Civil War?

The first Armenian-Americans often lived and worked together, since they spoke the same language. Another thing shared by these early immigrants was a love of their church. On Sundays, they would gather together to pray and sing our hymns. With-

out an ordained priest, however, they could not celebrate the Badarak they loved.

By 1888, there were about 1,200 Armenians in the United States. Some of them asked the patriarch in Constantinople (today, Istanbul) to send a priest who could celebrate our Divine Liturgy. The Patriarch sent Father Hovsep Sarajian, and the first Badarak in America was celebrated on July 28, 1889. After much hard work, the first Armenian Church in America was consecrated in Worcester, Massachusetts on January 18, 1891. Now the Armenians were really home!

Strangers in a Strange World

We began this lesson with the Prayer for Travelers in remembrance of the first Armenian immigrants to America. These men and women left behind everything they knew to move to a new land. They understood very little about the culture they were entering. The faith they brought with them from their church helped them make a better life here in America.

Today's Christians are a lot like people who leave familiar things to live in a place they have never seen. We were not present to see Jesus die on the Cross and then walk out of the tomb. We did not go to see him heal the blind or raise Lazarus from the dead. Our belief in these events comes from faith.

What is faith? How can we see it? Where does it come from? One place we can see faith is in God's Creation. We do not have to doubt that the sun will rise in the morning, or that snow is cold. God set up his world so we may depend on many things in nature. Even events such as earthquakes and hurricanes, which seem random, are the result of natural forces that come together in a consistent way.

We also see faith in God's Word. In the Bible, we see God's promises to us. We learn about the inspiring faith of others. We even see Jesus' perfect faith in the Father, which he followed all the way to the Cross.

Our Armenian Way

Mgrtitch Khrimian was born in Van in 1820. From childhood, he loved the Bible and the Armenian language. Later in life he became a priest. After becoming the Prelate of Moush, then a bishop, Mgrditch Khrimian was elected Patriarch of Constantinople but resigned to pursue his literary activities. In 1878, upon his return from the Congress of Berlin he preached his famous "iron ladle" sermon. He described the meeting of representatives of different countries as all having an "iron ladle" and their best interests as all being in a big "pot." The Armenians only had a "paper ladle" – they were powerless – and so they were unable to gain what was rightfully theirs.



Elected Catholicos of all the Armenians in 1892, he spent the rest of his life in Etchmiadzin. Lovingly called *Hayrig* (Father), he suffered for the miseries of his people and strived for their well-being, education, and intellectual awakening. He encouraged his flock to behave as one Armenian Christian family. He worked hard to help the Armenians build bridges of faith and love.

Because he established the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America in 1898, Khrimian Hayrig reminds us of the first Armenian immigrants to the United States who were able to unite their Armenian culture and church heritage with their new home, America.
