Let's Talk

Shortly after Jesus Christ was crucified and rose from the dead, two apostles of Jesus arrived in Armenia.

They were St. Thaddeus and St. Bartholomew. They taught everyone about Jesus. The Armenian Church is known as an apostolic church because the two apostles were sent by Jesus to preach in Armenia.



Thaddeus and Bartholomew could speak Armenian. The people could understand them, but there were no books written in Armenian letters.

How would you have felt if you met St. Thaddeus or St. Bartholomew? What questions would you ask them?

When St. Gregory baptized the King of Armenia almost two hundred years later, there was still no Armenian alphabet!
This is what "Love one another!" might look like in another alphabet.

Long ago there was an Armenian language but no alphabet. So even grown-ups could not write their names in their own language. There was one book that the people wanted to understand and that was the Bible.

In church they would hear the Bible in other languages. "O Lord, let us hear your word in our own Armenian language." This was the prayer of the Armenian people.

With the help of Catholicos Sahag and others, a priest named Mesrob Mashdotz created an Armenian alphabet. But there were some letters missing. He prayed every night: "O Lord, give light to my mind, so that I may find the missing letters."


One day, his prayer was answered. St. Mesrob was half asleep and half awake. A smooth rock appeared in front of him, and a divine hand was writing the missing letters! St. Mesrob woke up and gave thanks to God.

The Bible was the first book to be translated. The prayers of the Armenian people were answered. This happened more than 1600 years ago, around 406 A.D. Both Sahag and Mesrob are saints of the Armenian Church.




Those words were said long ago by someone who loved God's word. Listen to what he said again. How does the Bible light up *your* life?

Sharing Our Faith
